A **conjunction** is a word that joins together words, phrases, or sentences. *Example*: Mr. Saber is a happy <u>and</u> fun-loving farmer. <u>Although</u> he is well into his fifties, he is like a kid at times. His wife wants him to grow up, <u>but</u> he prefers to be young at heart.
