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Spelling Patterns

Knowing some vowel patterns and having a clear concept about rhyming help you remember and spell unfamiliar words more easily.

Vowel Patterns



All words contain at least one vowel.

The letters "a", "e", "i", "o", and "u" are vowels.



The letter "y" is sometimes a vowel, depending on where it is in a word.

When "y" is placed in the middle or at the end of a word, it usually has a vowel sound.

e.g. bye, cycle, sky ← long "i" sound funny, jolly ← long "e" sound



When two vowel letters are placed together, very often the first letter has a long vowel sound while the other is silent.

e.g. rain ← long "a" sound leaf ← long "e" sound



Rhyming Words

Rhyming words are words that have the same ending sound. They usually have endings with the same spelling too. To spell rhyming words, you simply have to change the first or first few letters of the words.

e.g.

dog king log ring thing

There is Mike the Mouse living in the house with his spouse.

Vowel Patterns


- All words contain at least one vowel ("a", "e", "i", "o", and "u").
- Sometimes "y" is a vowel when it is placed in the middle or at the end of a word.
 - e.g. baby, fly
- When two vowel letters are placed together, the first letter has a long vowel sound; the other letter is silent.

e.g.

boat ← long "o" sound
